- ◆ Drugs often dominate Multiple Sclerosis (MS) research focus & resources, but other themes also rank highly as priorities for patients with MS and carers: prognosis of disability, multidisciplinary social and health care, psychological health and exercise.
- ◆ Cochrane reviews should be prioritized towards the most urgent, pressing health challenges worldwide to drive improvements in global health and wellbeing.
- ◆ Involving consumers in the priority-setting process helps to identify relevant topics

Improving alignment between research priorities and needs of people with multiple sclerosis: A worldwide, multi-stakeholder priority setting exercise


Background: In 2020, the Cochrane Multiple Sclerosis (MS) Review Group, with the Cochrane Neurological Sciences Field, launched a global priority-setting exercise to elicit the research priorities of people with MS (PwMS), carers, advocates and healthcare professionals. **Prioritizing pressing questions** could ensure that future **systematic reviews are as useful as possible for the people who need them.**

Results Table 1. Five top priority-ranked topics by 1,190 respondents

Question	Respondents who chose the question as top priority
Does MRI help predict disability worsening of PwMS?	19.9%
What are the benefits and harms of treating PwMS with one disease-modifying drug compared to another?	19.3%
Does multisciplinary care by teams of different social and health professionals improve health outcomes and experiences for PwMS?	11.9%
Does psychological health affect disease progression in PwMS?	9.2%
What are the benefits and harms of exercise for PwMS?	7.2%

- Highly representative of PwMS
- · Free-text questions allowing respondents to:

Limitations

- Web-based, convenience sample approach may have favored respondents with digital knowledge and a web connection. Further
 improving accessibility and generalizability should be considered in future priority setting.
- Balancing anonymity with data on important determinants of people's care needs (respondents' age, gender and disease status).



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
